HOUSES TO BE RE-NUMBERED

Work to Start Monday Under Direction of Town Engineer.

Harold Haywood and Harold Field, both local boys who have been employed during the past year by Town Engineer Warner in engineering work about town, will start out Monday on their work of distributing the new house numbers. Last summer and fall the entire town was resurveyed and the houses on each street were correctly numbered. These young men will call at each house, giving the people there the correct number and will be provided with samples of metal numbers, for wnich they will be pleased to take orders. Several different styles will be shown and the householders will have an opportunity of changing their present style of numbers if they so desire. The renumbering will, in a great many cases, facilitate the locating of many houses, as the numbers were placed in a hit or miss fashion when the streets were first built up. The mail carriers and the express drivers will probably be greatly pleased when all the new numbers have been assigned and placed.



- Boolean allows you to use logic like AND, OR, NOT
- Stemming uses grammatical variations of search terms
- Fuzziness is a scale 0-9. Lower number, closer match needed. 0 = Exact match
 - Ex. "Spring" closer match than "Sprain"
- Phrase "w/5" searches within 5 words of previous term
- Wildcards: * matches any number of missing characters,? matches one missing character
- (filename contains([insert here])) finds all filenames with "insert here"
 - Each newspaper scan is saved with the city name, name of the newspaper, and years (though some are ranges like "2012 – 2015")


Rufus A. Lilly, court messenger, has sold

Registry of Deeds Tips:


- Many deeds/plans do not have full address, only street name. You can leave out Street #
- Note different spellings of "Spring Ter" and "Spring Terr"...
- I have found multiple instances of a grantor's name being misspelled and/or alternate names
 - You may have to search by date or last name only if no previous deed is found with grantor's name



Miscellaneous Tips

- Plan file structure ahead of time
 - A folder for each website/source
 - A folder inside each source folder for each type of file: maps, directories, newspaper articles
- Save files in consistent format
 - YYYY-MM-DD [Topic] is what I used for newspaper articles
 - Ex. 1902-11-05 Building Record for 1902
 - Date first will arrange files chronologically when sorted alphabetically
- Try variations of names/words when searching
 - "st" vs "street" vs "str"
 - "Bob Johnson" vs "Robert Johnson" vs "Rob Johnson" vs "R Johnson" vs. "R J"

So, when was my house built?

 A process of elimination was needed since Frederick E. Wells built a number of houses, and houses weren't originally numbered as today

- Very likely built in 1902
 - City assessment data lists 1897, which does not seem to fit the facts
 - Other houses on Spring Terrace have inaccurate dates in assessment data too.


